## FIELD TRIPS

Every Saturday: Arcata Marsh and Wildlife Sanctuary. These are our famous rain-or-shine docent-led field trips at the Marsh. Bring your binocular(s) and have a great morning birding! Meet in the parking lot at the end of South I Street (Klopp Lake) in Arcata at 8:30 a.m. Trips end around 11 a.m. Feb. 6: Tony Kurz; Feb. 13: Ken Burton; Feb. 20: Larry Karsteadt; Feb. 27: Cindy Moyer.

Saturday, February 13: McKinleyville Hot Spots. Join Rob Fowler ([707] 616-9841) for this half-day field trip, exploring some of McKinleyville's best birding locations. Hiller Park, the Mad River estuary and mouth, the McKinleyville bottoms, sections of the Hammond Trail, and the School Road trail will be some of the locations visited. Expect to visit diverse habitats, which will help us obtain a high species list of around 60 to 80 species. ## KEEPING PREDATORS IN THEIR PLACE

When we hear the term "predator control," we often think of government trappers going after coyotes or ranchers shooting wolves. If we define the word "predator" more universally, predator control has broader meaning.

We have a love-hate relationship with many predators, mainly our favorite canine and feline companions. We love the prey (birds) but also have close ties to our own predators, dogs and cats. That makes sense because most of us generally like all animals.

Dogs have the longest evolutionary history with humans, going back 18,000 to 30,000 years, while cats have only been semi-domesticated for about 4,000 years. Most people, even those who don't live or work with dogs, recognize with over 80% accuracy what a dog means by its bark. Dogs and humans have evolved together. Dogs look *where* you point; cats just look at the pointed finger. Although different—dogs as pack versus cats as solitary hunters—both have been used by humans for hunting, pest control, and companionship. Only dogs have accepted "work" such as herding.

As much as we like our dogs and cats, we recognize that it is important to prevent them from preying on and disturbing birds. Dogs should not chase birds on the beach, and cats should not have access to wild birds. By controlling our domestic predators, we control ourselves as predators to a limited extent. Even as we manage to control our favorite predators, we leave birds exposed to

"outsiders": raccoons, neighborhood cats, rats, and corvids are attracted to our feeders, shelter, and garbage. Denying predators access to food and shelter is the next, but fairly easy, step in protecting yard birds from predators.

Expanding predator control beyond your yard or property is not easy. Some neighbors may be willing to not leave pet food out for skunks and raccoons and to control their pets, but others will be resistant. It can be hard to convince a neighbor that their bed of ivy or bunch of Pampas grass is likely harboring rats that raid birds' nests, much less to persuade them to spend money to redo landscape and confine their pets.

It is up to each of us to pursue National Audubon Society's concept of science, education, and law to achieve bird conservation. Part of the reason RRAS exists as a nonprofit organization rather than a loosely bound band of birders is to be more effective in doing the not-so-easy work. One of the goals we set at our annual retreat was to expand our urban and backyard bird conservation efforts. We hope to have a talk on this topic at one of our monthly member meetings that will kick off an ongoing program of yard-bird conservation. Here's hoping that the only predator at your bird feeder will be a bird of prey.

If you're interested in urban bird conservation, come to the Conservation Committee meeting at noon on the second Thursday of each month at Rita's in Eureka.



Elias Elias will guide a group of birders around the sagebrush flats and conifer forests of Lassen County 5 hours east of Humboldt. We will bird for duck and geese in the agricultural fields and wildlife areas of the Honey Lake Valley on Saturday morning. Early afternoon will find us in the conifer forests (Cassin's Finches and Lewis's Woodpeckers) around Janesville, CA. We will end the day in the juniper woodlands (the soon-to-be-split White-breasted Nuthatch, Townsend's Solitaire) in Jack's Valley north of Susanville. On Sunday, we will have a dark start as we will meet before first light at the sage-grouse lek. This lek will likely be the highlight of the trip. Prepare to be entertained by upwards of 10 Greater Sage-Grouse as

they dance and strut and pick and choose. Bow-chicka-wow-wow. Follow this link for some background intel: <a href="https://youtu.be/cLnbiTkj1TQ">https://youtu.be/cLnbiTkj1TQ</a> We will then bird around Susanville and Eagle Lake before disbanding about 2 p.m. for the 5-hour drive home. Please book your own room in Susanville for Friday and Saturday nights. Camping is available at the Fleming Unit, which is where Elias will stay unless the weather is absolutely miserable. Plan on eating in the field for all meals except for Saturday night dinner and Sunday post-lek breakfast.
